THE HOLY FOREFATHERS

On the Second Sunday Before the Nativity of our Lord, we celebrate the Holy Forefathers. These are the holy men and women of the Old Testament who shone forth in righteousness.

God worked great signs and wonders through our Holy Forefathers, to prepare for the Entrance into the world of His Son, born in the flesh of the Virgin Mary.

These righteous men and women responded to the call of God, served Him with devotion, and many of them fervently anticipated the coming of the Messiah, the Promised One.

As we remember them on this day, we too, seek to respond to God's call to us, to lift up our hearts in thankful prayer to Him for His promises and to expectantly prepare for the celebration of the coming of Christ into our lives, in an ever more profound and intimate way.

Mentioned in the hymns of this feast day are the following saints of the Old Testament: Adam, Abel, Seth, Noah, Enoch, Abraham, Issac and Jacob and his twelve sons, known as the Twelve Patriarchs. Among the women saints we find, Sarah, Rebecca, Rachael, Judith among others. All the Prophets are named such as Elias, Isaiah, Daniel, Moses, and others down to St. John the Baptist. The King-Priest Melchizedek, Job, David and the Three Youths – Shadrach, Meschach and Abednego are also hymned.

Let us offer praise to the Fathers, Who shone forth before and during the Law; With righteous minds they served the Lord And Master

Who shone forth from the Virgin, And now they delight in the unending Light!

COMMENTARY ON PSALM 118 by St. Theophan the Recluse (+1894)

Verse 21: Thou has rebuked the proud; cursed are they that decline Thy Commandments.

Pride and conceit are repugnant to God. He who has a high opinion of himself often trips on a trifle, and if not brought to his senses, he is attacked by shameful passions and made to feel the removal of God's grace. This is inner temptation, the outer one is made by the proud one and can be very painful, and the Prophet prays to be spared that one.

Verse 22: Remove from me reproach and contempt, for after Thy testimonies have I sought.

Those who live in the fear of the Lord have to suffer contempt, But when this gets unbearable, they ask help of Him Who promised To protect His servants. Contempt suppresses energy, he who has To bear it asks either for strength to endure it or deliverance From it, understanding however that nothing removes the pus of Conceit as well as contempt.

Verse 23: For princes sat and spoke against me, but Thy servant Pondered on Thy statutes.

The Lord promised blessedness for slander, yet how difficult it is to be borne! Assurance of the conscience is a solace against slander, but who is without sin? For Christians something else is revealed here, namely: love for one's enemies. He who fulfills this Christ's commandment receives from it such a benevolent disposition that the bitterness of hatred is eliminated.

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OCA Holy Synod and Metropolitan Council conclude first day of joint meeting

SYOSSET, NY [OCA Communications] — Members of the <u>Holy Synod of Bishops</u> of the Orthodox Church in America and the <u>Metropolitan Council</u> concluded the first day of their extraordinarly two-day joint meeting here on Tuesday, December 12, 2006.

The complete text of a statement issued at the end of their session reads as follows.

"The questions regarding the allegations of financial improprieties were addressed today in an all-day joint session of the Holy Synod of Bishops and the Metropolitan Council in a historic step forward. Presentations by the accounting firm Lambrides Lamos Moulthrop LLP and the law firm Proskauer Rose LLP, confirmed the following allegations:

- "1. Processes in place for administrative and financial controls have been circumvented since at least 1998.
- "2. There were numerous unsubstantiated large cash withdrawals.
- "3. Personal credit card abuses using Church funds were documented.
- "4. Numerous trips were taken without the submission of appropriate documentation but were nonetheless reimbursed.
- "5. Attempts to divert monies designated to various charities were clearly indicated and in some cases documented.
- "6. Examination of Church appeals from 2001 to 2005 revealed that meaningful reports could not be rendered due to lack of appropriate documentation.
- "7. Pattern of personal use of Church money was exhibited for a number of years.
- "8. Lack of timely financial reports and in some cases, false reports, were submitted.
- "9. Large amounts of Church funds were used to improperly pay for personal items.

"The severity of some of the problems could not be fully determined due to a lack of documentation. However, these abuses of Church trust were determined to be centered on and around one individual and were not found to be widespread among the employees of the Church.


"The participants of the joint session were stunned by the magnitude of today's revelations and have agreed to implement the following actions:

- "1. A Special Committee was appointed by His Beatitude, Metropolitan Herman to complete the investigation by Proskauer Rose and to keep the Metropolitan Council advised of developments as they occur. The Committee consists of His Eminence, Job, Archbishop of Chicago, Diocese of the Midwest; His Grace, Benjamin, Bishop of Berkeley, Administrator of the Diocese of the West; Very Reverend Vladimir Berzonsky, Diocese of the Midwest; Very Reverend John Reeves, Diocese of Western Pennsylvania; Mr. Gregory Nescott, Diocese of Western Pennsylvania; and Dr. Faith Skordinski, Diocese of Washington and New York.
- "2. The Holy Synod will discuss what disciplinary action, if any, will be recommended.
- "3. The Metropolitan Council will oversee the implementation of appropriate accounting procedures in the OCA's accounting office, which will include the replacement of antiquated accounting systems.
- "There is still much work to do, and many details need attention. But the new direction is clear changes need to be made in order to bring the Church up to the high level of accountability that is expected of it."

TWO QUESTIONS WE NEED TO ASK ABOUT THE NATIVITY OF CHRIST by St. John of Kronstadt

1) Why did God, become man while remaining God?

The answer to this may be found in the words of the Archangel to Joseph, the betrothed of the Holy Virgin: God became man to save "His people from their sin" (Matthew 1:21). For this reason He is called Jesus,



And so, my brethren, the feast of the Nativity of Christ reminds us that we are born of God, that we are sons of God, that we have been saved from sin and that we must live for God and not for sin; not for flesh and blood, not for the world which lies in evil (1 John 5:19), not for earthly corruption, but for an inheritance incorruptible...reserved in heaven the Lord Himself will give you a sign, behold a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call His name Emmanuel (Isaiah 7:14).

2) What does God's incarnation require of us?

As we prepare to meet the feast of the Nativity of Christ, you must ask yourself:

Have you preserved the spiritual birth from God which we each recevied in Baptism?

Are you always heedful to the divine sonship and the sacred treasure of the Spirit which you acquired in Baptism?

Have you grown closer to God through faith and love, like His beloved children?

Have you loved one another as befits children of God?

Have you despised evil and all-destructive sin?

Have you loved truth and every virtue?

Have you loved immortal and eternal life prepared in a land which will not pass away and to which we are called by Him Who now has come to our corrupt earth?

These are the questions which we must ask ourselves now and decide; not only with our minds, but above all, with our hearts and our very deeds.

The birth of Christ requires of us to remember and hold in sacred honor the fact that we are born of God; and if we have sullied and trampled upon this birthright with our sins, we must restore it by washing it with tears of repentance.

The feast requires of us mutual love, humility, that we help one another; for how can we not love one another when we see the love of God for us? Like the Wise Men, let us brothers, also prepare gifts for the new-born King. Instead of gold, frnakincense and myrrh, let us bring Him the Gifts of faith, hope and love.

ON THE NATIVITY OF OUR LORD Metropolitan Hierotheos of Nafaktos

The Birth of Christ is a historical event, because it took place at a specific moment in history, when Caesar Augustus was Emperor of Rome and Herod was ruler of Judaea. The Evangelists insist on emphasising the historicity of the event, because they want to say that Christ is a historical person. This means that Christ assumed real human flesh, and the incarnation was not merely seeming or imagined.

In spite of its historicity, this event remains a mystery. We know that the Godman, perfect God and perfect man, exists, but it remains a mystery how the divine nature united with human nature in the person of the Logos. Moreover, what happened to the person of Christ, that the divine nature was united hypostatically with human nature, happened just once. Therefore St. John of Damaskos said that Christ is "the only new thing under the sun". This means that since the creation of the world and man, nothing new has happened in the world. Everything is repeated. The birth of a man is a consequence and result of God's words: "Let us make man in our image and likeness", and "Be fruitful and multiply; fill the earth and subdue it" (Gen. 1, 26-28). The only new thing is the Godman Christ.

Thus the fact that the event is historical does not remove the mystery, but also the mystery does not do away with the historicity. At Christmas we celebrate the birth of Christ, but at the same time we experience mysteriously in our hearts all the events connected with it, for when we are alive in the Church, we are participating in and experiencing all the stages of the divine incarnation.
