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
The Universal Church Glorifies the Company Of All the Saints

The Venerable Bede (†735 A.D.)

Today, beloved brethren, we celebrate in one joyful solemnity the feast day of all the Saints. In their society Heaven exults, in their protection earth rejoices, in their triumphs the holy Church is crowned. The more endurance they showed in giving witness, the brighter is the glory of that witness; for, as the battle was fiercer, the glory of the fighters was greater. The many kinds of suffering enhance the triumph of martyrdom; and the greater the torments, the greater also the reward. Our Mother the catholic Church, spread far and wide over the whole earth, was taught in Jesus Christ her Head to fear neither insults, crosses, nor death. Grown stronger and stronger, not by resisting but by enduring, She has breathed the will to victory into all those whose containment in this earthly prison forms them into an opposing army, that they may be inspired to fight the good fight with no less ardent courage than these who have gone before.

O truly blessed Mother Church, basking in the glow of God's favor, adorned with the glorious blood of the victorious martyrs and clothed in the virginal white of an untarnished Orthodoxy! Her garlands lack neither the rose nor the lily. We should each then strive, dear brothers, to gain the great dignity of these two honors, either the white crowns of virginity or the red of suffering. In the Heavenly camps, both peace and war have their garlands with which to crown the soldiers of Christ.

For the unutterable and immense goodness of God has seen to it that the time of labor and struggle should be neither prolonged nor long-drawn-out nor endless, but that it should rather be brief and, as we might say, momentary. For the struggles and the labors belong to this short and hard life, but the crowns and the rewards of merit to that which is eternal. The labors, then, will be ended quickly, but the rewards of merit will continue without end. And after the darkness of this world, we are to see the most radiant light and to receive a blessedness greater than the bitterness of all sufferings, as the Apostle testifies when he says, "The sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory to come that will be revealed in us."

"Scraps" are deputy head of Moscow Patriarchate Department for External Church Relations Father Vsevolod Chaplin's sketches on various subjects beginning from church life to international politics. The Interfax-Religion continues publishing some of them.

Today many Christians including the Orthodox are enthusiastic about the idea of "tolerance" and often use this term. I would not see anything bad in it, if it meant just observing normal rules of the human community: toleration, mutual respect, ban on insulting words and actions.

However, "tolerance" is often considered a prohibition to have any definite ideas about truth and lie. My acquaintance and an official of the Council of European even said from the scaffold that any dialogue with believers was meaningless till they abandoned their "exclusive" truth claims. When they try to inject "tolerance" under the brainpan or set it up to the altar, when it becomes a symbol of relativism and indifference, Orthodox Christians shouldn't keep silent or echo it. It is the matter of world outlook directly opposed to the Gospel of Christ.

Liberal Protestant Churches such as the Lutheran Church and the Reformed Church like to instruct us that the faith cannot be implanted by the power of state. However, they exist in Europe and have abundant property there because once they were established by kings, princes and electors. They would have vanished without such support like many other confessions. Thus if they accuse Orthodoxy of firming up thanks to special relations with authorities and social preferences, let them first give up all the buildings obtained and constructed in compliance with the principle "the one who enjoys power, sets up the faith."

No doubt, this principle is deeply defective. It is not Christian to enforce faith violently. Though no Christian nation was created without persistent education and preaching, without implanting faith through social mechanisms of self-organization. It is not by chance that the new religion of deifying a man is so freely inculcated by means of law, politics, education and propaganda.

Today many airports have prayer rooms of various religions and confessions. Brussels is probably the most politically correct. There are three churches-chapels: Orthodox, Catholic and Protestant, a mosque, a synagogue and... a cabinet of "humanistic consultant." All "cult" establishments are open night and day. Only the glass door of "an atheistic priest" is usually locked and one can see only a table piled with books and magazines. The most notable item on it is a full ash tray. I've been a frequent guest in the airport, but only once I saw "the consultant" there, it was a bored bearded man of unattractive appearance, who was sitting at the table. He noticed me and made a welcoming gesture. But I didn't feel like going to "an atheistic confession"...

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One Lutheran pastor said at a conference: "Let's drop the word "God" from the Gospel and it will become a stand for the dialogue with atheists." Perhaps, we'd better drop the very Gospel? There are so many things "impeding the dialogue" in it... Let's keep the story about the left cheek and add something about ecology and democracy.
