

THE ANNUNCIATION - CELEBRATED MARCH 25TH

From the Prologue of St. Nikolai Velimirovich

When the All-Holy Virgin completed the fourteenth year after her birth and was entering her fifteenth year, after having spent eleven years of living and serving in the Temple of Jerusalem, the priests informed her that, according to the Law, she could not remain in the Temple but was reguired to be betrothed and enter into mar-

riage. What a great surprise to the priests was the answer of the All-Holy Virgin that she had dedicated her life to God and that she desired to remain a Virgin until death, not wanting to enter into marriage with anyone! Then, according to Divine Providence, Zacharias, the high priest and father of the Forerunner, under the inspiration of God, and in agreement with the other priests, gathered twelve unwed men from the Tribe of David to betroth the Virgin Mary to one of them to preserve her virginity

and to care for her. She was betrothed to Joseph of Nazareth who was her kinsman. In the house of Joseph, the All-Holy Virgin continued to live as she did in the Temple of Solomon, occupying her time in the reading of Sacred Scripture, in prayer, in Godly-thoughts, in fasting and in handiwork. She rarely went anywhere outside the house nor was she interested in worldly things and events. She spoke very little to

anyone, if at all, and never without special need. More frequently she communicated with both of Joseph's daughters. When the fullness of time had come, as prophesied by Daniel the Prophet, and when God was pleased to fulfill His promise to the banished Adam and to the Prophets, the great Archangel Gabriel appeared in the chamber of

the All-Holy Virgin and, as some priestly writers wrote, precisely at that same

moment when she held open the book of the Prophet Isaiah and was contemplating his great prophecy: "Behold, the virgin shall be with child, and bear a son!" (Isaiah 7:13). Gabriel appeared in all of his angelic brightness and saluted her: *Rejoice, highly favored one! The Lord is with you" (St. Luke 1:28), and the rest in order as it is written in the Gospel of the saintly Luke. With this angelic annunciation and the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Virgin,

the salvation of mankind and restoration of all creation began. The history of the New Testament was opened by the words of the Archangel Gabriel: "Rejoice, highly favored one" This is to imply that the New Testament was to signify joy to mankind and to all created things. It is from this that the Annunciation is considered not only a great feast, but a joyful feast as well.

To Conquer the Enemy is to Conquer Ourselves By St. Leo the Great (†461)

In the days of Saul and David, it was when the Israelites fell into sin that the Lord allowed the

Philistines to oppress them. In order to regain their ascendancy over their enemies, the people were ordered to fast. The Israelites understood that there was no use for them to try to win their freedom by taking up arms; they first had to rid themselves of their sins. So they began to discipline themselves and to conquer the desire of the flesh to be able to conquer their opponents. When they fasted their oppressors gave way before them, when they indulged all their appetites the enemy held them in subjection.

It is the same with us today. We have

our own struggles and conflicts, and we can win by using the same tactics. The Israelites were attacked by human beings; we are attacked by spiritual enemies. We can conquer by bringing our lives into line with God's will for us; then our enemies will give way

before us. It is not their power but our lack of self-discipline that makes a threat to us, and we shall weaken them by overcoming ourselves. We must ask God's help in this warfare, because our only means of conquering the enemy is to conquer ourselves.

THE QUESTION OF WEIGHT: A BIG SIN AND SMALL SINS

At one time two women came to Confession to a certain elder. The first of them was burdened by one terrible sin, for which her conscience trobuled her continuously, and the other had no grave sin but only the "usual" little ones.

The elder, having listened to them, ordered that they go to the orchard and bring stones from it. To her who had the one serious sin, he said: "You take the heaviest stone that you can lift and bring it to me."

And to the other he said: "Here's a bag for you. Gather small stones and bring them here." When they both had fulfilled their tasks, the elder thanked them for their obedience and said: "And now, take back that which you have brought to me and put it in its previous place." The first sinner did this without difficulty, but the other lost her head and returned with virtually a full bag because she couldn't remember which stone she took from where and she was afraid to deceive the elder.



So then the elder said to her: "Look, your acquaintance has a heavy sin, but she remembers it and constantly mourns over it all the time, but the tears of repentance wash away any sin. you are unable to mourn over your sins because you don't even remember them, but the weight of your bag is no less than the weight of a big stone."

Indeed, we must all learn that all of our "small" sins, the majority of which are forgotten, in their mass form a terrible weight, which pulls us toward the underworld if we do not free our souls from them by true repentance.

THE MEANING OF WORDS

Penitence - the condition of being penitent, sorrow for wrong doing.

Contrition - sincere sorrow for wrongs.

- Penance The Mystery or Sacrament of the Church, in which confessed sins before the priest are forgiven. Also called the Mystery of Repentance or Reconciliation of Confession.
 - a secondary meaning of penance is that it is a specific undertaken given by the priest in Confession to a sinner to help them in awareness and struggle over sin. A penance may be certain prayers, number of prostrations, reading or charitable acts.
- Confession the act of revealing our sins to God, before the priest who stands as a witness. A Sacrament of the Church in which sins committed after Baptism are forgiven.
- Repentance is more than sorrow or regret, but is fundamentally a change. The conversion or turning of our whole life towards
- Compunction the state of being in awareness both of one's own sinfuliness and of the forgivesness extended by God; a mingled feeling of sorrow, tenderness and joy, springing from sincere repentance.
- Worldly Sorrow sorrow for wrongs inasmuch as one feels guilty and unhappy.
- Godly Sorrow a sorrow for wrongs which nourishes the soul with the hope engendered by repentance; a gift from God.



STRUGGLE AND SPIRITUAL WARFARE

From 3rd Homily of St. Macarius the Great (+390)

One thing is required – that one should have treasure in his soul and the life which is the Lord in his mind, so that, whether he works of prays or reads, he should have that possession which cannot be lost, which is the Holy Spirit.

There are those who say that the Lord requires only visible fruits from men. The interior ones God will rectify But this is not the way things are. For as one defends himself against the exterior man, so also he must enter into the lists and do battle against his thoughts. For the Lord demands of you that you be angry with yourself and engage in battle with your mind, neither consenting to or taking pleasure in wicked thoughts.

Still, to uproot sin and the evil that is so imbedded in our sinning can be done only by divine power, for it is impossible and outside of man's competence to uproot sin. To struggle, yes, to continue to fight, to inflict blows, and to receive setbacks is in your power. To uproot, however, belongs to God alone. If you could have done it on your own, what would have been the need for the coming of the Lord? For just as an eye cannot see without light, nor can one speak without a tongue, nor hear without ears, nor walk without feet, not carry on works without your hands, so you cannot be saved without Jesus nor enter into the Kingdom of Heaven.

Suppose you say: "I do not outwardly corrupt myself by fornication or adultery nor do I commit the crime of avarice, therefore it follows that I am justified." You are completely off the mark in such thinking that you have perfectly fulfilled everything. There are not just three categories of sin against which one must guard oneself, but the number is legion. Arrogance, presumption, unbelief, hatred, envy, deceit, hypocrisy, where do these come from? Are you not obligated to war against these in your inner thoughts? If a robber invades your house, are you not at once greatly distressed? He does not allow you to be freed from anxious worries. You begin to fight back against him. You exchange blows. So ought also the soul to strike back, to resist, to strike blow for blow.

Consequently, when the will fights back in its trouble and affliction, it begins to gain the upper hand. It may fail; it rises. Then sin pounces on the soul and wages ten or twenty conflicts. It overcomes the soul and pins it down. But then the soul, after a while in a momentous struggle, overcomes sin. If the soul preserves without letting down its guard in any area, it begins to emerge victorious as it sees through the deceit of sin and so it wins the crown of victory over sin.
