'Israeli Christians: Oil-streaked icon 'miracle

RAMLA, Israel (AP) — Christians have been flocking to this dusty Israeli town to see what locals are calling a miracle: streaks of what looks like oil mysteriously dripping down an icon of St. George at a Greek Orthodox church named for the legendary third .century dragon slayer

Worshippers said Tuesday that the more than two dozen streaks might represent God's tears or the Christian rite of baptism. The church priest, Father Nifon, first saw the .streaks while preparing for Sunday morning services, they said

He kissed all the icons, and when he reached that one, he took down the picture and he" cleaned it," said Aida Abu el-Edam, an English teacher and longtime church member.

"After 20 or 25 minutes, he looked again and he saw the oil again and said, 'This is a "'.miracle

El-Edam, 47, said she was convinced the streaks were a miracle in part because of a strange smell emanating from the icon. She said it reminded her of her visit as a teenager to the site of a miracle in Ermysh, Lebanon. There, she said, the odor came from a recently deceased woman whose Christian faith was legendary

It's a special, holy smell," she said. "It's not ordinary, like olive oil. It's something"
".strange that comes from God

The Greek Orthodox patriarch inspected the painting Sunday, el-Edam said, and the church has sent a sample of the oil to a laboratory

Father Nifon said the Greek Orthodox Patriarchate had asked him not to speak publicly or to answer questions about the streaks, so that believers could draw their own .conclusions

About 50 Christians crowded around the icon Tuesday, some from near Ramla and others from other parts of Israel. They were joined by curious Jews and Muslims, some snapping cell phone pictures. Ramla, a mixed Jewish-Arab town of 65,000, is in central .Israel between Jerusalem and Tel Aviv

The icon hangs near the front of the church, hidden from most pews by a small gold chandelier. A nun dressed in black was rubbing the bottom of the icon with cotton balls, which she handed to the faithful who sometimes smelled them before clutching them to their chests.

People these days, they've forgot God and this is a sign to tell them, 'I'm still here,'"
said Edith Fanous, 31, who works for a local trucking company and said she has been
attending St. George's since she was a little girl

Fanous said she was singing in the church choir when the oil streaks appeared Sunday. She guessed as many as 1,000 visitors had been to the church since then. She dismissed the idea that the streaks could just be paint running on a hot day

This icon is 114 years old," she said. "It passed through so much weather, hot and cold."

And now that we have air conditioning in the church it's started to melt? I don't think

Kosty Tannous, 33, an Israeli customs worker, said he thought the streaks may have appeared now because God sees trouble in Israeli society

There's war and discrimination," he said. "I see a lot of discrimination against Arabs" here in Israel, and maybe this is a good lesson for everybody to love each other and live ".with each other with equal rights

THE SOCIAL VIRTUES TO BE PRACTICED

Almsgiving. "When thou doest alms, do not sound a trumpet before thee as the hypocrites do, that they may have glory of men. Let not thy left hand know what thy right hand doeth. And thy Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly."

Giving without hesitation. "Give to him that asketh thee, and from him that would borrow of thee turn not thou away" (Matt. 5:42). Give all in the name of Christ and for the brotherhood's sake.


Loving your enemies. "Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you" (Matt. 5:44). There is no other way to cooperate with Christ, or to establish peace and brotherhood.

Doing good to men. How? Just as we wish that men would do to us. "Whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets" (Matt. 7:12). After the two great commandments of Christ, this is the greatest.

Forgiving your brother. "If thy brother trespass against thee, rebuke him, and if he repent, forgive him. And if he trespass against thee seven times in a day, and seven times in a day turn again to thee saying: I repent, thou shalt forgive him" (Luke 17:3-4). Try to experience the joy of forgiving.

Humbleness. Christ was born in a stable. Why should we then strive after the highest honors and the first places? "Go down and sit in the lowest seat." "For whosoever exalteth himself shall be abased, and he that humbleth himself shall be exalted" (Luke 14:10-11).

Show pity to sinners. That is the way to help and reform them. Ridiculing and condemning them is of no avail. Christ considered them sick. He visited them (Zaccheus), ate with them (Matthew), spoke kindly to them (women sinners), and thereby restored their spiritual health and human dignity.



Reconciliation. Before going to church, and also before being drawn before a court of law, a Christian should try to reconcile himself with his adversary (Matt. 5:23-25). However, "If thy brother shall trespass against thee," take action gradually, as was clearly prescribed by the Lord (Matt. 18:15-17).

Confessing Christ courageously before men. "Whosoever shall confess Me before men, him will I confess before My Father which is in heaven." (Matt. 10:32). "Whosoever shall be ashamed of Me and My words, of him the Son of Man will be ashamed, when He shall come in His own glory" (Luke 9:26).

Caution over false christs. The unbelievers and foes of Christ will try in the last days to proclaim themselves or some other false and violent persons as "christ" instead of the one true Christ the Lord. Foreseeing this Jesus warned: "Take heed that no man deceive you. For many shall come in My name saying I am Christ, and shall deceive you" (Matt. 24:4-5).

Responding to duties. "Render unto Caesar the things which are Caesar's, and unto God the things which are God's" (Matt. 22:21). It means, to render to the worldly authorities the worldly tributes and to God the spiritual tributes. As the image of Caesar is on the money, so the image of God is in man's soul.

Reasonableness. "Unto whomsoever much is given, of him much shall be required" (Lk. 12:48), be it health or wealth, knowledge or honor. If you are given less, less shall be required of you. God's justice is precise and absolute. It is unreasonable to hold a grudge against such a law.

Readiness to serve. Service has been ennobled since and through Christ. Thus willing servants of men in the name of God are the new nobility. "Even the Son of man came not to be served, but to serve" (Matt. 20:28). "If I, your Lord and Master, have washed your feet, ye also ought to wash one another's feet...I have given you an example" (John 13:14).

Readiness to sacrifice, not merely material things but life too, for Christ's sake, which is the same as to say for our eternal salvation's sake: "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends" (John 15:13). We may have many friends, but the greatest of all is Christ.

Hopefulness, or Christian optimism. In all afflictions, calamities, persecutions, and even tortures and death, a Christian is hopeful. For he remembers Christ's words: "Great is your reward in heaven." "Fear not them who kill the body but are not able to kill the soul." "I have overcome the world." "All power is given unto Me in heaven and on earth."
