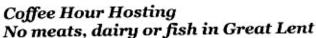

9th Anniversary of Kosovo Pogrom March 17-19, 20, 2004

March 17th, was the 9th anniversary of the anti-Serb violence that happened in Kosovo, Serbia. During this rampage by Albanian terrorists and extremists more than 4,000 Serbs were expelled, 938 homes were destroyed and 35 Orthodox churches were desecrated. All this happened over a 3 day period. 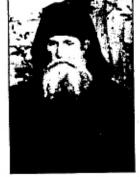
ON CONTROLLING THE TONGUE

THE LITURGY OF THE PRESANCTIFIED GIFTS

ХРИСТОВО

The eucharistic Divine Liturgy is not celebrated in the Orthodox Church on lenten weekdays, since the full Divine Liturgy has a joyful character not in keeping with the somberness of the Great Fast. However, in order for the faithful to sustain their lenten effort by participation in Holy Communion, the Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts is served. The service is an ancient one in the Orthodox Church. We officially hear about it in the canons of the seventh century, which obviously indicates its devel-

opment at a much earlier date.

On all days of the holy fast of Lent, except on the Sabbath, the Lord's Day, and the holy day of the Annunciation, the Liturgy of the Presanctified is to be served (Canon 52, Quinisext, 692).

The Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts is an evening service. It is the solemn lenten Vespers with the administration of Holy Communion added to it. There is no consecration of the eucharistic gifts at the presanctified liturgy. Holy Communion is given from the eucharistic gifts sanctified on the previous Sunday at the celebration of the Divine Liturgy, unless, of course, the feast of the Annunciation should intervene; hence its name of "presanctified."

The Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts is served on Wednesday and Friday evenings, although some churches may celebrate it only on one of these

days. It comes in the evening after a day of spiritual preparation and total abstinence. The faithful who are unable to make the effort of total fasting because of weakness or work, however, normally eat a light lenten meal in the early morning.

During the psalms of Vespers, the presanctified gifts are prepared for communion. They are transferred from the altar table where they have been reserved since the Divine Liturgy, and are placed on the table of oblation. After the evening hymn, the Old Testamental scriptures of Genesis and

Proverbs are read, between which the celebrant blesses the kneeling congregation with a lighted candle and the words: "The Light of Christ illumines all," indicating that all wisdom is given by Christ in the Church through the scriptures and sacraments. This blessing was originally directed primarily to the catechumens — those preparing to be baptized on Easter — who attended the service only to the time of the communion of the faithful.

After the readings, the evening Psalm 141 is sol-

emnly sung once again with the offering of incense. Then, after the litanies of intercession and those at which the catechumens were dismissed in former days, the presanctified eucharistic gifts are brought to the altar in a solemn, silent procession. The song of the entrance calls the faithful to communion.

Now the heavenly powers (i.e., the angels) do minister invisibly with us. For behold the King of Glory enters. Behold the mystical sacrifice, all fulfilled, is ushered in.

Let us with faith and love draw near that we may be partakers of everlasting life. Alleluia. Alleluia. Alleluia.

After the litany and prayers, the Our Father is sung and the faithful receive Holy Communion to the chanting of the verse from Psalm 34: "0 taste and see how good is the Lord. Alleluia." The post-communion hymns are sung

and the faithful depart with a prayer to God who "has brought us to these all-holy days for the cleansing of carnal passions," that he will bless us "to fight the good fight, to accomplish the course of the fast, and to attain unto and to adore

the holy resurrection" of Christ.

The Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts is traditionally considered to be the work of the sixth-century pope, Saint Gregory of Rome. The present service, however, is obviously the inspired liturgical creation of Christian Byzantium.

On the Taking of Psychiatric Medications

Question: Are Christians allowed to take psychiatric medicines? Because many maintain that anxiety, depression, melancholia and in general, psychiatric disorders of the soul are healed only with spiritual life: that is with prayer, going to church, Confession and Holy Communion.

Answer: When necessary, Christians may take these medications.

Question: But what can these medications do to the soul of a person?

Answer: We must clarify from the beginning that the so-called psychiatric medicines or tranquilizers – that is, these material substances – cannot in any way give man's soul the longed for calmness, nor to bring consolation and hope to the soul of a mother – for example – whose son has died, not even to deliver the conscience of a man from the guilt of the sins which he committed. These gifts "come down only from above, from the Father of lights." And only the celebrants (priests and spiritual fathers) of the Church are able to heal these conditions of people.

Question: Then why did you say that the psychiatric medicines are necessary?

Answer: Listen! Anxiety and depression in people are caused not only by such-above mentioned factors, or even from a financial ruin or from repression of their personalities and loss of self-esteem etc...but also from factors which originates in the nervous system (the brain) of man – in other words, from the disturbance of the higher functions of the brain, such as emotion, thought, will, etc. This type of anxiety or depression is improved or even healed with psychiatric medicines, medicines that is, which act on brain functions in such a way as to bring them back to their normal rhythm.

To put it more simply: Many Christians focus their attention on the immaterial component of man – that is the soul; attributing to it alone the manifestations of anxiety, melancholia etc. and thus they reject the medicines given the fact that matter cannot effect the immaterial. They forget though, that man also has a body. And because the brain, through which the soul is expressed, is an instrument of the body,

with material means (that is with medicines or earlier on with insulin comas or electroshock) its disturbances must be dealt with.

Question: What do you mean when you say the soul expresses itself through the brain?

Answer: An image which we could use to describe the relationship of soul and brain is the violin with violinist. Just as even the best musician cannot make good music if the violin is broken or unstrung, in the same manner man's behavior will not be whole (see. Timothy 3:17) if the brain presents a certain disturbance, in which case the soul cannot be expressed correctly. It is precisely this disturbance of the brain that certain medicines help correct and so aid the soul in expressing itself correctly.

Question: Can intense sacramental life or fervent prayer heal these disturbances of the brain?

Answer: Of course, God can do a miracle for these sufferings. The question however, which was posed to me in the beginning was something else. I was asked if Christians are allowed to use psychiatric medicines. And to this I responded undoubtedly. Yes. Simultaneously, however, I also as you: Why don't you ask the same questions about bronchial asthma, for example, or eczema or migraine headaches or glaucoma or intestinal ulcers, etc.? Let us finally realize that anxiety, melancholia, depression, etc. does not only come from the disturbance of the soul, but also from the disturbance of the brain or from a combination of the two.

In the final case, psychological support is also needed (the solution of problems, selfless assistance, behavior salted with the salt of discernment, so that those who pose such problems do not feel difficulty from the manifestations of our love, examination from an educated, pious psychiatrist who will also enlighten them about the nature of the disturbances, the invocation of divine aid, the approaching to the Sacraments of the Church etc.) and simultaneously a medical therapy.

Neuropsychotic Disturbances and Sexual Purity

Question: A certain number of mental health experts consider the keeping of sexual purity during a young age as a cause of psychiatric illnesses. What do you say?

Answer: This viewpoint of theirs is mistaken and the explanation for this is very simple. All those who visit the psychiatrist are ill. No one who is healthy goes to such a doctor for no reason. So, because now a certain percentage of these patients don't engage in sexual activity, they reach the conclusion in combination with Freudian theories that the cause of the neuropsychic disturbance is sexual abstinence. I though know tens of youth who are sexually pure and naturally they have health of soul.
