The Feast of Holy Pentecost Sunday, June 23, 2013

Dearly Beloved in the Lord:

Christ is in our midst!

As we celebrate once again the Great Feast of Pentecost, we commemorate the Descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and the Birth of our Holy Church. And, in celebrating this milestone event in salvation history, we do well to recall from the pages of the Scripture what the Church is and what it means for us to be a member of the Church.

In Saint Paul's Epistle to the Ephesians, the Apostle teaches us clearly the meaning of "the Church" and the meaning of membership in it. And, the Holy Fathers \sim Saint John Chrysostom and Saint Gregory of Nyssa \sim in their commentaries on this famous letter of Paul, explain clearly for us the patristic understanding.

First, Paul tells us that the Church established by Christ and to which the Spirit gave birth is one Church:

"...There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called in one hope of your calling; one Lord, one faith, one baptism: one God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, and in you all." (Ephesians 4: 4-6)

In his commentary on this passage, Chrysostom tells us that, "for this reason is the Spirit given, that He might unite those who are separated by race and different manners; for old and young, poor and wealthy, child and adolescent, woman and man, and every soul become in a manner one, and more entirely so than if there were one body. Now what is that one body? The faithful throughout the inhabited world, both which are, and which have been, and which shall also be."

Saint Paul goes on to tell us that the reality of the Church is people, men and women who are energized by the Holy Spirit: "To each one of us grace was given according to the measure of Christ's gift." (Ephesians 4:7)

What this means is that we are not all given the same gifts, but together as the Church we are equipped to do God's will. Saint John explains that "gifts are bestowed not for the honor of one above the other, but for the work of the Church ... for the building up of the Body of Christ."

The Apostle goes on to say that the head of the Church is none other than Christ Himself: "...speaking the truth in love, we may grow up in all things into Him Who is the head - Christ - from whom the

whole body, joined and knit together by what every joint supplies, according to the effective working by which every part does its share, causes growth of the body for the edifying of itself in love." (Ephesians 4:15-16)

Saint Paul also makes clear that each member of the Church is a new person: "No longer walk ... alienated from the life of God ... but put off concerning your former conduct according to the deceitful lusts, the old man ... and be renewed in the spirit of your mind ... (and) let each one of you speak the truth with his neighbor, for we are members of one another." (Ephesians 4:18-25)

Finally, a close study of Saint Paul's epistles shows that not just any assembly of individuals but, in a strict sense, only the Eucharistic assembly is called *ekklesia* or "the Church." For the Apostle the Church is the Body of Christ, and those are its members who share in Communion in the Body of Christ -- those who partake of the Holy Eucharist, Christ's own Body and Blood. For him, to reject the Eucharistic assembly is to despise the very Church of God.

Our Holy Church, then, is clearly the People of God; new persons baptized in Christ and Chrismated in the Spirit and united in the Holy Eucharist, who form the One Body whose Head is our Lord God and Savior Jesus Christ Himself.

On this Great Feast of Pentecost, the Descent of the Holy Spirit and the Birthday of the Church, let us recommit ourselves in the faith and service of Christ's Holy Church. Let us rejoice that God has called us to be His "fellow workers." (1 Corinthians 3:9) Let us focus on finding, and fulfilling, our role and our part in the Body of Christ. This is the holy work in which God has invited us to assist Him. Let us build up Christ's Body, unto the glory of Almighty God -- not just for today, but until He comes again.

THE DAY OF PENTECOST

WHAT DOES JESUS SAY ABOUT THE HOLY SPIRIT?

And I will pray the Father, and He will give you another Counselor, to be with you forever, even the Spirit of Truth, whom the world cannot receive because it neither sees Him or knows Him; you know Him, for He dwells with you, and will be in you.

-John 14:16-17

But the Counselor, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, He will teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you.

When the Spirit of Truth comes, He will guide you into all the Truth; for He will not speak on His own authority, but whatever He hears He will speak, and He will declare to you the things that are to come. He will glorify me, for He will take what is mine and declare it to you. All that the Father has is mine; therefore I said that He will take what is mine and declare it to you.

LIVING AS A CHRISTIAN

As Christians we are called to live in the light of the great gifts we have received. We enjoy the gift of life from the hand of God our Creator and the gift of eternal life in Christ:

"Out of nothing You brought us into being, and when we had fallen, You raised us up again. You have not ceased doing everything until You graciously gave us Your future Kingdom" (Liturgy of St John Chrysostom).

Three elements interact at the heart of our Christian life: grace, faith, and works.

- Grace: The source and basis of our life in Christ is God's gracious concern for us, the sheer gift of His love for mankind, which He gives to us unearned.
- Faith is our saying "yes," our enabling God to grace us, our accepting of God's gift, allowing Him
 to be generous to us.
- Our good works do not merit God's love for us, or even earn more of it. They are our response in gratitude for what He does for us. Having been adopted into God's family, we are responsible for managing what we have been given.

Synergy is the interplay of these three elements: God's initiative for loving us, our acceptance in faith, and our responsible management through works. God does not force His love on us: He offers it. We must accept His love openly to receive it, and then care for it responsibly to keep it. No one of these elements without the other defines the Christian life. All three together produce the fullness of God's life in us.

God's Free Gift: God gifts us with His life despite our weaknesses and failings. Though spiritually dead, we have been raised in Christ and exalted in glory with Him:



"God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ – by grace you have been saved – and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus."

(Ephesians 2:4-7)

Our Active Response:

- We believe that God is calling us to be divinized in Christ, by being united with Him through the Holy Mysteries.
- We respond in a "public life" of worship, fellowship and service in the Church and in a "secret life" of prayer, fasting and sharing in the depths of our hearts.
- All the while engaging in a "spiritual warfare": the life of repentance.

"For we are what He has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life." (Ephesians 2:10)
