#### 4. THE MYSTERY OF HOLY REPENTANCE (OR CONFESSION)

Q. What is Holy Repentance?

A. It is a Mystery through which our sins, when confessed, are forgiven and our reconciliation with God is restored.

## Q. Which sins are forgiven in the Mystery of Repentance and which are not?

A. All our sins which we commit after our baptism and which we confess to a priest and for which we repent are forgiven. The original sin, how-ever, cannot be forgiven by mere repentance without baptism. Also some mortal sins cannot be forgiven "either in this world or in the world to come", according to Christ's own saying (Matt.12:31).

Q. What are the requisites for this Mystery?

A. The confession of sins is before a priest, after which the priest reads prayers and grants, through the Holy Trinity, remission and absolution to the repentant person.

## Q. How do we know that sins are forgiven to a penitent person?

A. From the Holy Scriptures and from Holy Tradition. Christ forgave sins to the penitent, and the apostles did the same. From Tradition we know many instances of sinners who repented of their sins, corrected their life, and became saints.

## Q. Who gave authority to bishops and priests to forgive sins?

A. The Lord Christ Himself who said to His apostles: "Receive ye the Holy Spirit. Whosesoever sins ye remit, they are remitted unto them, and whose soever sins ye retain, they are retained" (John 20:23).

#### Q. When an offender is forgiven by the person offended, is it necessary that he still should go to the priest for confession?

A. It is recommended. For every sin which we commit against men we are committing against God also. For there is no sin which does not hurt God. Therefore, we ought to go to God's priests for confession and forgiveness.

# Q. With what disposition of soul should we go to the priest for penitence?

A. With sincere repentance and with a contrite heart; also with heartfelt forgiving of those who trespassed against us, and with willingness to obey the priest concerning the penance (epytimiya) imposed.

Q. What penance may the priest impose upon us?

A. Penance varies according to the gravity of our sins, as for instance: to fast, to pray, to make retribution for damages done to somebody, to give alms, and even to abstain from Holy Communion for a certain period.

#### Q. How often shall we go to confession?

A. The oftener the better. It is indispensable before going to Holy Communion; and it is urgently needed in sickness for we do not know the time of our death. Therefore we ought to be ready, quite ready, to join God's family in heaven, as repentant, forgiven and blessed children of God.



# Confession

Confession is the sacrament\* of repentance – a change of heart leading to forgiveness and healing.

It is based on Christ's promise to his disciples: 'If you forgive the sins of any they are forgiven' (John 20:22) and his saying: 'If your brother repents forgive him' (Luke 17:3).

True repentance means a movement towards healing. The penitent turns away from a side-track and towards the goal of the Kingdom of God.

The sacrament involves examining relationships with God and with other people, and seeking ways to improve. It is more than a dialogue between priest and parishioner: the Holy Spirit and Christ are present in a mysterious way.

# NEW BOOKS IN THE PARISH LIBRARY 2014-2015

The Cross Stands While The World Turns, John Behr (252.6 BEH)

This collection of homilies by Fr. Breck covers the feasts and fasts of the liturgical cycles of the Church, the Paschal cycle, the Nativity-Theophany cycle and the Theotokos cycle.

Give Me a Word: the Alphabetical Sayings of the Desert Fathers, John Wortley, translator (271.009 WOR)

This volume is an attempt to provide the reader with a readable translation of the oral tradition of tales and sayings of the monks living in the Egyptian desert at the beginning of the fourth century. A codification of this monastic lore arranged in alphabetical order by the name of the monk emerged towards the end of the fifth century.

The Human Work of Art, a Theological Appraisal of Creativity and the Death of the Artist, Davor Dzalto (261.57 DZA)

The author draws from the theological framework of Nikolai Berdyaev and John Zizioulas to reveal creativity as a vital part of the human person. His ideas are explored in dialogue with the modern art of Marchel Duchamp, Andy Warhol and others.

My Life's Journey, the Memoirs of Metropolitan Evlogy, as Put Together According to His Accounts by T. Manukhin, Part One, Alexander Lisenko translator (281.9092 EVL)

These memoirs encapsulate the life of a missionary and visionary of someone who was compelled to leave his home but tho then took that next courageous step and looked forward with his faith, seeing all around him Orthodoxy's enormous potential for growth.

On Christian Ethics, St. Basil the Great, Jacob N. VanSickle, translator (241 BAS)

Here St. Basil lays out a consistent theological ethic rooted in a nuanced appreciation for the supremacy of Scripture. These texts are for anyhone interested in early Christian approaches to ethics as well as the right use and interpretation of the Bible.

Orthodox Christianity, Volume III: the Architecture, Icons and Music of the Orthodox Chruch: Metropolitan Hilarion Alfeyev, (281.947)

This is the third volume of a detailed and systematic exposition of the history, canonical structure, doctrine, moral and social teaching, liturgical services and spiritual life of the Orthodox Church.

<u>Time and Man, Mantzaridis, Georgios, translator Julian Vulliamy, editor Harry Boosalis</u> (231.7 MAN)

This book includes discussion on such issues as the problem of time, space and time, Christ and time, the transfiguration of time, and liturgical time – among others. In addressing such topics the author shows how these are not simply abstract theological issues.

The Watchful Mind, by a Monk of Mount Athos, George Dokos, translator (242.72)

This book written by an unknown ascetic of the Holy Mountain in 1851 is the fruit of a life of deep prayer; he shares with readers his hidden life filled with spiritual struggles, ecstatic experiences and mystical revelations.
