

From "Unseen Warfare" by Saint Theophan the Recluse

Since the enemy watches you constantly, waiting for an opportunity to sow evil in you, be doubly watchful over yourself, lest you fall in the nets spread for you.

As soon as he shows you some fault in your neighbor, hasten to repel this thought, lest it take root in you and grow. Cast it out, so that no trace is left in you, and replace it by the thought of the good qualities you know your neighbor to possess, or of those people generally should have. If you still feel the impulse to pass judgment, add to this the truth, that you are given no authority for this and that the



moment you assume this authority you thereby make yourself worthy of judgment and condemnation, not before powerless men, but before God, the all-powerful Judge of all. This reversal of thoughts is the strongest means, not only for repelling accidental critical thoughts, but also for completely freeing yourself of this vice...

Even if a person's sin is not only obvious, but very grievous and comes from a hardened and unrepentant heart, do not condemn him, but raise

your eyes to the wondrous and incomprehensible judgments of God; then you will see that many people, formerly full of iniquity, later repented and reached a high degree of sanctity, and that, on the other hand, others, who were on a high level of perfection, fell into a deep abyss. Take care, lest you also suffer this calamity through judging others.

FOUR TYPES OF COMMUNION WITH GOD

Our union with God in general terms comes about in two ways: through the mystical communion of the Body and Blood of the Lord and through spiritual communion.

- 1. The first and most important communion with Christ takes place through the partaking of His Body and Blood at the Divine Liturgy.
- 2. The second way of communion and union with Christ is in the prayer of Jesus, during which the intellect is plunged into the heart and there says unceasingly, "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner."
- 3. The third way of communion with God our Creator takes place through the keeping of His commandments and the acquisition of the virtues.
- 4. And the fourth way of communion with Christ takes place through the reading and hearing of the Word of God in the Holy Scriptures.

Our Orthodox Church is the special, most holy place in which is realized our many-sided communion with Christ. Therein, all of our faithful, approaching the divine services with piety and faith, dwell in a mystical atmosphere and communion by the mind, heart, prayer and participation in the divine communion of the gifts of the Holy Spirit.



LIVES OF THE SAINTS

Saint Nicholas

Have you ever wondered if there was a saint who is especially known for his love for children?

St Nicholas of Myra is one saint who was particularly fond of children. He showed his love in many ways and, as we shall see, still does today by helping and protecting them.


What would you do if your brother, sister, or friend were kidnapped? On December sixth long ago, a family was celebrating St. Nicholas Day. They were unwrapping some of their presents when the door flew open. Two men ran in and carried away the youngest child. What would you have done if you were there? What could you do? Every day the family prayed to God. They prayed also to

St. Nicholas, asking him to work a miracle. For a whole year the family prayed for the child's safe return. Exactly one year later, on St. Nicholas Day, the child who had been kidnapped was returned home safely. St. Nicholas and God had heard the family's prayer. The child was safe.

St. Nicholas was born around the fourth century. That is nearly 1600 years ago. He was the archbishop of Myra, which today is located in Turkey. We celebrate his feast-day on December 6. We celebrate it by going to Church. It is a custom in many Orthodox homes around the world for children to put their shoes out on the night before St. Nicholas Day. The next morning they find them filled with candy, an icon, and a pencil or a pen (or with coal if they've been naughty). This custom reminds us of the gifts St. Nicholas left secretly for the poor when he was alive.

Like the family of the kidnapped child, we also can pray to St. Nicholas for help. Christian sailors know St. Nicholas to be their protector when they are out to sea. He is also the patron saint of those who study and he protects those who travel from robbers.

We, too can ask St. Nicholas to pray for us each day to help us do that which is good for ourselves and for others.

The relationship of a person and his money is fundamentally a spiritual matter: it reveals as much about his relationship with God as does his discipline of prayer or any other "religious" activity. Jesus said in Matthew 6:21, "Where your treasure is there shall your heart be also." Somehow, in some way, what a person does with his money, how he thinks about it, where he spends it, what he will do to earn it, and the things to which he will give it, are some of the real clues to who he is inside, to what is essentially important to him, to what is really in his heart... The places where we make our most serious investments are the places where our real self, our inner self, is going to be most interested, most teachable, most responsive, and most open. To deal with a person in terms of what he does with his money is to deal with most people where they really live.

11 THOUGHTS ON THE NATIVITY FAST

Patriarch Daniel of Romania

- 1. We fast not to be seen and praised by men, but to draw nearer to God.
- We fast because we love God more than His material gifts which we can consume.
- Forgiveness is a good way to begin the Fast. No one can enter upon a spiritual struggle for purification without forgiveness.
- Fasting supports the prayer of believers who consider their connection with God to be the center, light, and nourishment for their souls.
- 5. True fasting is not simply abstaining from animal products, but also to abstain from material greed and the pursuit of selfish domination over others, and also the limiting of any thoughts, words, or deeds which diminish your love for God and others.
- If the Fast is accompanied by deeds well-pleasing to God, then fasting makes us light for others and chosen vessels of God's glory.

- 7. The Fast is not only a material, but a spiritual condition—that is, a fast of the eyes, mouth, and heart.
- 8. Fasting is the spiritual condition of sacrifice or offering of those who fast freely and in accordance with their powers.
- 9. During the Fast, the amount of our material food decreases, but spiritual food increases.
- 10. Fasting supports prayer, while fasting without prayer is not a spiritual work.
- 11. Fasting calms egotistical passions, enlightens the mind, sanctifies emotions, and changes our attitudes and behavior towards others and nature, placing all in the life of the presence of God's love.
